Event summary:

As part of the European IDEA project, organised by the Collectif T'Cap, Adapei and the Compagnie du Cercle Karré, participants from cultural third places in France, Belgium (Le Monty) and Finland (Malakta) met at Europa Nantes on 14 November 2024. The colloquium, entitled "Cultural third places: how to bring diversity to life", explored exemplary initiatives in terms of social and cultural diversity.

Three experiences were highlighted:

- Le Beau Tiers-Lieu (Nantes) is a community centre dedicated to well-being, project support and cultural diversity.
- Wattignies (Nantes), a cooperative space for sustainable food and solidarity activities.
- Le Monty (Belgium), a former cinema transformed into a cultural and inclusive venue.

The discussions highlighted the importance of inclusion, social links and activism, while also addressing the economic and institutional challenges. The shared visions brought to the surface dreams of multi-purpose, supportive and committed spaces for the years to come.

Rita Schladt: Local councillor and territorial cultural commitment

Rita Schladt, a member of the Communauté de Communes du Pays de Blain, has signed an agreement with the Compagnie Cercle Karré to promote their work at various venues across the region. This inclusive theatre company, which brings together actors with and without disabilities, has its roots in the local area, having been founded in a local ESAT. Keeping this company in the region was essential, hence the importance of this official collaboration.

Since the agreement was signed a year ago, Cercle Karré has stepped up its activities They are a powerful tool for cultural democratisation. They are a powerful tool for cultural democratisation. The company has also taken part in international exchanges with a twin town in Germany, where their visual and non-verbal approach transcended language barriers, winning them a local prize.

Denis Poulain: Supporting the spread of cultural inclusiveness

Denis Poulain, in charge of production and distribution, is actively working with Cercle Karré to promote their latest show. In his opinion, their work is a challenge for cultural programmers, who are used to a traditional framework. Although their performances have a place in seminars and special events, the aim remains to integrate them more into mainstream cultural venues.

Thierry Seguin: A path to recognition for artists with disabilities

Thierry Seguin, a player in the professionalisation of artists with disabilities since



1994, highlights the impact of Cercle Karré's achievements. Recognition of the work accomplished is relatively recent, but it has enabled the creation of a dedicated space, similar to a third place, where social diversity and inclusive projects come together. This centre, although locally based, has a regional and national reach, and aspires to have an international impact, notably through the Paralympic Games.

Cultural and inclusive challeng What are the prospects?

A key challenge lies in raising awareness among cultural programmers, who are often reluctant to include artists with disabilities in their programmes. Although the Ministry of Culture has shown its financial and symbolic support, cultural and organisational obstacles remain.

An appeal has been launched to bring these players together and identify the obstacles to be overcome.



At the same time, budget cuts in culture, both in France and abroad, are putting added pressure on inclusive initiatives. The lack of access for artists with disabilities to institutions that facilitate their professionalisation reflects a failure to apply constitutional rights and the principles of the 2005 law on accessibility.

Concrete proposals and future prospects

- Adaptation of artistic schemes: Create an intermittence scheme adapted for artists with disabilities, with reduced hours and the right to dedicated support.
- Support for coaches: Inspired by foreign models, the idea of a fund dedicated to supporting artists with disabilities, financed by bodies such as Agefiph, could be tested.
- Collective mobilisation: a network of local structures to improve accessibility and develop teaching tools adapted to the artistic education of young people with disabilities.

Conclusion: Shared dreams

- **Denis Poulain**: Keep faith in the future and never give up.
- Rita Schladt: Preserving initiatives despite the precariousness of local funding.
- Thierry Seguin: We mustn't deprive ourselves of the creative and human richness provided by PSH artists.

A call to action

With 30% of the world's population directly or indirectly affected by disability, cultural inclusivity can no longer be marginalised. These artists are bearers of



universal narratives and values that transcend borders, offering an inestimable wealth to our societies.

Karine Nevers - Co-president of Beau Tiers-Lieu

Le Beau Tiers-Lieu was born out of a citizens' movement in the Bottière district of Nantes. Initially, residents united against the construction of a road in their neighbourhood. Once this struggle had been won, the question of what was missing from local life came to the fore. With the support of the town hall, a space was made available to the collective, giving rise to a multifunctional space: a café with digital services, cookery workshops and a listening centre for residents.

Over time, a second space was opened to support the unemployed in developing their projects, reinforcing the social impact of the third place. Operating as an association with a collegiate governance structure, the Beau Tiers-Lieu relies on two employees, a project manager and a facilitator, and mobilises a team of volunteers. One of its key initiatives was a multicultural fashion show highlighting the diversity of the neighbourhood, with traditional dress from 90 different countries.

For the future, the project is looking ahead to a large 'château' planned by the public authorities for 2029, which will include a cinema, restaurant and wellness areas. Karine, a care assistant who was retrained after the pandemic, plays a pivotal role as coordinator and sounding board in this open and inclusive place.

Sarah Huvelin - Wattignies Manager

The Wattignies community centre, located in an area that underwent a major gentrification in the 1990s, took root in a former tyre shed. It was first reopened as a squat,





In 2021, it will become a cooperative space focused on sustainable food.

With a hundred or so members, this atypical place brings together 11 resident structures, including a creative recycling centre set up in a bus, a second-hand shop and a green second-hand shop that recovers plants destined for destruction. La Cloche, a partner association, offers

A listening café for people in very precarious situations. A donation area and a coffee available for €1 reinforce the inclusive and supportive spirit of the venue.

The future of Wattignies is taking shape with the developer of the Île de Nantes: by 2027, a new building should incorporate the activities of the community centre on the ground floor, ensuring continuity of its activities. For Sarah, Wattignies is as much about activism (for sustainable food and against violence) as it is about creating social links and fighting isolation.

Pierre Seraille - Monty coordinator (Belgium)

The Monty, a Belgian third-place, came to life in a former 1950s cinema that closed in the 1970s. Today, the venue is run by a theatre company, Teuf Théâtre, which owns the premises, while the café itself is a rent-free tenant.

The Monty offers a wide range of activities, including a canteen, bar, restaurant, debates, documentaries and an international puppet festival. Pierre, who is in charge of community involvement and music programming, stresses the importance of inclusion, whether for people with disabilities or those living in extreme poverty.

The annual budget of €600,000 is based partly on income from the bar and restaurant, supplemented by public subsidies. For Pierre, the Monty is also a place to fight against the extreme right, LGBTQ+ discrimination and all forms of exclusion. The future of the Monty is dreamt of with a roof garden, accessible meals and optimum soundproofing between spaces.

Shared visions for the future

 Karine (Beau Tiers-Lieu): A château with multi-purpose spaces for wellbeing, culture and a project incubator.



- **Sarah (Wattignies)**: A large green space, with offices, a nursery, and open spaces to strengthen community links.
- **Pierre (Monty)**: A place where inclusion, culture and conviviality come together, with a committed and diverse programme.

The impact of third places

All agree on the ability of third places to respond to crucial social needs: the fight against isolation, civic engagement and support for vulnerable groups. These projects, though different in structure, embody spaces for social mixing, dialogue and local transformation, while at the same time carrying forward militant struggles for a fairer, more inclusive society.










Feedback from participants & analysis

Just over 93% of participants found the event satisfactory or very satisfactory.

Reason for attending the event:

- Gain a deeper understanding of third places and the associated issues.
- Discover and share the practices and realities of Nantes' third places.
- Find out more about the issues of citizen participation and involvement.
- Promoting access to culture and artistic expression, particularly for people with disabilities.

Background:

- Part of the European IDEA programme (Innovation Diversité Explorations Alternatives) to strengthen diversity, inclusion and European cooperation around cultural third places.
- An opportunity to discuss practices in France, Belgium and Finland as part of an Erasmus+ educational project.

Topics covered and main interests:

- Round Table 1: Artistic pathways and inclusive cultural programming. Exploring the obstacles and levers to promoting artists with disabilities in cultural venues.
- **Round Table 2:** Civic participation and diversity in third places. The importance of social diversity, solidarity and local initiatives in creating shared living spaces.



Specific objectives and interests:

- Sharing experiences on cultural inclusion and the realities of third places.
- Discover tools and practices to encourage civic and cultural participation.
- Exploring the links between third places, culture and disability to enrich local and European projects.

The results show that the participants are highly motivated to explore ways of improving third places to make them more inclusive, supportive and accessible, particularly for people with disabilities. This dynamic is part of a desire for European exchange and cooperation, in response to the contemporary challenges of cultural, social and artistic inclusion.




- The personal commitment of the three witnesses to the third places, reflecting their own life paths.

These results show that the event was a place of learning, reflection and sharing, with moments that were both intellectually stimulating and humanly connecting. The diversity of testimonies, exchanges and experiences enabled participants to gain a better understanding of the social and cultural challenges of third places, while at the same time experiencing their concrete impact through culture, entertainment and conviviality.

General trends:

1. Understanding and exploring third places:

Discover and explore the issues surrounding third places, particularly their role in social and cultural dynamics.



 Understand the importance of third places in the face of current societal challenges, such as inclusion, diversity and civic engagement.

2. Opening up new perspectives:

- Discover a field of activity that is still unknown to some participants, broadening their professional and personal vision.
- Learn from concrete examples of third places and innovative projects on a local and international scale.

3. Networking and professional exchanges:

- Add to your professional address book by meeting people involved in managing and running third places.
- Encourage potential collaboration through exchanges of experience and best practice.

4. Global reflection on cultural and hospitality issues:

- Examine existing practices to improve the way we welcome a wide range of visitors, particularly those with disabilities.
- Reflecting on cultural and social approaches that promote a more inclusive and supportive society.

These trends reflect a general interest in third places as vectors of innovation, diversity and social transformation.

The major trends to emerge from this event illustrate a general desire to **strengthen the place of third places** in society as spaces **for creation, inclusion, sharing and innovation**. Their role in **social development**, **cultural diversity** and **civic participation** is now recognised as essential to meeting the challenges facing society today. These spaces offer concrete solutions to the problems of exclusion, inequality and social fragility, while acting as **vectors of transformation** within local and European communities.

These comments show that despite the efforts made at events to promote inclusion and accessibility, there are still **relevant questions** and **unmet needs**.

The issues raised call for continued efforts to **improve the inclusion of people with disabilities** in third-party venues, both at the level of the **organising teams** and the **invited public**.

They also underline the **constant reflection needed** to make these spaces even more **accessible** and **inclusive**, while highlighting **the key role of third places** in a changing society, where **inclusion**, **equality** and **diversity** are central concerns.
